James and Ameera have been funded by the Tees Valley Combined Authority to help enable access to walking and cycling within Hartlepool alongside the work the Community Engagement Team are doing, they do multiple projects like a bike maintainance workshop and guided rides on Wednesdays from Greenbank. They do 1-1 sessions to teach people to cycle, arrange safe cycling routes for

the community and help people to arrange travel plans to safely cycle to where they need to be. This coincides with the Community Engagement Team as the two have been making links to provide access to safe cycling at events as well as getting to them.

Social Service Community Support Team

The team is pushing to get itself centred back on the ward, as well as working with the Community Engagement Team within the new year. Given their focus on bringing people together, they are hoping to work closely with the Engagement Team to have referrals go to community-led events.

Salaam Centre

Fiona has started the new year with a new arrival in Hannah from Poolie Time Exchange. They are also seeking another team member in the form of a Community Development Worker. Enquiries for which can be sent to the Christmas Party, held at the Centre, was a great a success with over 100 people coming along from across the ward. a number of the Ukrainian families joined in the party in national garb and sang traditional Ukrainian Christmas songs.

Salaam Centre Groups

On Mondays the Centre welcomes Ukrainian families to come together as well as offering them support around getting to know the town, from this, their is hope that other Hartlepool families can become hosts for other Ukrainian families.

Also on Mondays the centre acts as a Warm Hub between 1 and 6pm, This is also the case on Thursdays but from 1pm-4pm. During this time, everyone has access to IT equipment, food, games and books as well as being welcome to join in a natter.

On Saturdays everyone is invited to ESOL classes and on Tuesdays there is a Girl's Together Group which do different activities based on what group members want to do. The Centre was also successful in their bid to the Multiply Fund. Within 2 weeks, they hope to have classes and lessons to help people to learn basic skills that can help them in day-to-day life like numeracy and cooking.

The Salaam Centre is looking to expand in the new year with Hannah joining the team, alongside a volunteer from Poolie Time. The Centre is looking at making its open hours more flexible.

The Girls Group that's running from the Centre is going to expand it's age range due to demand.

The women's only swimming sessions had a lot of interest expressed but no feedback has been received.

The team are looking for a sessional worker for young people, which would help them reach out and help more people. Finally, the Centre has been funded to create a toy library.



Youth Provision Survey Outcome

The group is meeting to discuss the outcomes of the previous survey surrounding what children want to see out of their local area. The group have also been supported by the Youth Justice Fund to bring learning to local play areas like the skatepark. They give out free tickets to qualifying young people to attend the regular sessions while learning more about how to stay safe with collaboration with the local police force. The scheme is on Saturday mornings for 5 weeks.



Reading is Fun

Led by Jack, Reading is Fun is a council run scheme to allow young people access to an after school reading/homework club. The Scheme has 8 places currently and runs out of Community Hub Central between 4-5pm and is on offer for 9-14 year-olds.

Ronnie Bage

Ronnie came along to inform the board of his findings about the Victoria Ward. This was data that show disparities between male and females in Hartlepool and more specifically the Victoria Ward. One of the causes Ronnie was keen to stress his belief that this could be is fatherlessness. His Idea for solutions to this issue is to have joint working areas that multiple organisations can provide joint services to give help to the young people but also providing them life skills and coping techniques that may be missing due to not having a parental figure.

Lynnfield School

The HAF project that ran from the school had a handful of attendees, though not as many as they would have liked, possibly due to timing as several schools hadn't yet closed for the holidays. They are hoping to run a similar HAF scheme in the summer holidays. The Hartlepool Huskies are running another afterschool club for the school but for years 3-6. SureStart have pulled out of the centre as they are moving to the Central Hub. The school are looking to host playgroups for their students to go alongside the adult ESOL courses on Tuesday at

9:30 and Alliance Incredible years Training on Thursdays. Hartlepool BabyBank will be meeting up to try and see if they can also collaborate. The school are also currently arranging coffee mornings, which you can find out more about by getting in touch.

START - Substance misuse



Hartlepool Baby Bank

Billy Knight is new in role and trying to find other organisations to assist with and link up to. Alongside his colleague Michaela, they are trying to pool community resources and learning to both reach the widest demographic possible. A proportion of their staff have lived experience of substance misuse so are best placed to provide relatable assistance to the service users. The group are seeking volunteering opportunities to allow their users chances to get out and find employment. They are hoping to link in with sports and social based groups as these can be two of the biggest motivators in combatting substance misuse.

BabyBank

The BabyBank runs town-wide but is based in the Victoria Ward in Crown Buildings Avenue Rd, TS24 8RZ, UK. They have clothing, toys, cots, beds, prams, sports gear, hygiene nappies and everything in-between. The group currently see around 170 families a week for these, advice on parenting, benefits advice and signposting to other local services on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays, however they do offer this support 365 days a year if contacted. They have a 'safe space' where people can come for discreet help and translators for Arabic,

Tees Valley Sport

Flippin' Pain has been supported by Tees Valley Sport to influence how services that affect chronic pain sufferers are ran. They are looking for community groups, organisations and workers that work with people with chronic pain to an event at the Riverside Stadium on February 15th.



Youth Justice

The team has had recent sessions within Tryin' HQ and the Millhouse Leisure Centre to help to encourage healthy habits and activities. This has been in line with the whole family approach that Youth Justice are hoping to take their service, which would ensure that the support young people are getting can also be provided by their care-giver. There will be a session on the 1st of February to engage less activeyoung people and another session called Introduction



to behaviour change on the 15th February. Previous online sessions have been well

attended.



Community-Led Businesses

Nancy is seeking feedback from local people groups and organisations at to what service they would like to see which might keep people from going into council funded or health services. This might be a home hairdresser as a way of providing social support to someone who is feeling isolated. She will then gather these opinions and aim to fund and support existing or set-new small enterprises which could deliver their own service but in a way that benefits the community.
